Fitness to Practise Directorate – Council meeting, 14 May 2014

The following provides an update about the work of the Fitness to Practise Directorate

Case Information

The statistical information and commentary on information relating to the work of the Fitness to Practise Department can be found in the management information pack. This document provides other relevant information. It should also be noted that as we have reached the year end for 2013/14, the Executive are in the process of preparing the Fitness to Practise Annual report. The report is a statistical report analysing the arrangements that have been put in place to protect the public and analyses all phases of the process.

Key Forecast and Management Information Summary

The number of open cases both at the Pre ICP and Enquiry was higher than was forecasted at the 9 month point. More detail is provided later in this report on the activity we are undertaking to ensure case progression.

The number of cases per case manager increased to above forecast levels in March. This is in part due to resignations in January and February. The vacant positions and new positions for 2014/15 have now been filled which should reduce case numbers per case managers back to forecast levels. We are currently undertaking a piece of work to aid us in ensuring and improving resilience in the case management function. We are also looking at the mix and complexity of cases to ensure appropriate resources are allocated to the management and investigation of cases.

GSCC transfer cases August 2012-March 2014

At the end of March there were 5 open cases pre ICP and 23 open post ICP. We are anticipating concluding those cases shortly. Further analysis of GSCC transfer cases will be undertaken as part of the annual report preparation.

Case Progression

A key component of the work of the department is to ensure effective progression of cases. Since January, we have been working to enhance our processes and to establish if there are areas where we need to take a different approach to case management activities, or if there are themes or trends that can be identified at an early stage that may impact on future planning or progression

Our current optimum lifetime of an FTP case is 15 months in duration, from receipt of complaint to conclusion at a final hearing. There are several sub stages within this lifetime, each with their own measure which are used to monitor progression and management of cases.

These are: meeting the standard of acceptance(SOA) (2 months), consideration at Investigating Committee panel (within 7 months), and conclusion at final hearing (within 15 months).

The Professional Standards Authority measures all regulators performance from the date of receipt of the complaint.

Our analysis has demonstrated that it is taking longer to obtain the appropriate information to meet the SOA within two months from receipt of the complaint. There are a range of reasons for this: the changing nature of the cases received and their complexity; the increase in cases relating to vulnerable parties; and the source of the complaint changing to include more members of the public, or organisations that have traditionally not had involvement with HCPC or its processes.

Currently, 45% of cases that have not met the SOA are up to two months old; 65% are up to four months old; 84% are up to seven months old, and 94% are up to 12 months old, when measured from the receipt of the initial complaint.

The time taken to obtain this initial information can impact on future progression activities. Currently, 60% of cases that are awaiting an ICP consideration are within the service standard measure of up to seven months. Similarly, 62% of cases that are awaiting a final hearing are currently up to 15 months old.

In order to establish how we can manage this, we have reviewed all cases that are outside of the service standards, and assigned a risk rating. Cases rated as red have an escalation plan and are monitored at the FTP Management Meeting. Amber rated cases are also monitored and assessed to see if additional input is required, and green cases have been assessed as outside of the service standard due to an isolated issue, but are now progressing to plan.

For these cases, we are developing an approach on closure, to review and identify triggers that will help our ability to identify similar cases in the future, or that will indicate changes to our training or systems. Examples may include how we use our existing powers to request information under article 25, or how we monitor and escalate the chasing of this information throughout the lifetime of the case. We have also already started to meet with employers or stakeholder groups to clarify our powers and the timescales for sending information.

We have also analysed the case progression from the point where the SOA has been met. It is clear that once the SOA is met, the process moves as anticipated, with 85% of the cases awaiting an ICP consideration being up to 7 months old, and 76% of those awaiting a final hearing being under 15 months old.

The difference between current performance and the 90% internal measure at each stage is only 15 of the 307 cases awaiting an ICP, and 44 of the 350 cases awaiting a final hearing.

We are updating the management information pack to provide more information on the proportions of cases at each stage in the process, and their age. We are also reporting on an exception basis for cases that fall outside of the measures described above.

These new measures will be included in the next Council paper, including data that commences with activity from 1 April 2014.

Other Activity

Independence in Adjudication and Increased Efficiency

We are undertaking work to look at the mechanisms we can undertake to improve and insure independence in adjudication. Council will be asked to consider a paper looking at this at its meeting in July 2014. We are also looking at a range of technological solutions to increase the efficiency of our adjudication function.

Quality Assurance Framework

We have a comprehensive programme of assurance activities that cover the operational decision making and monitoring of compliance with process and procedures. Such monitoring feeds into our learning and enhancement to process. The framework supports the activities within the work plan. As part of the framework we are reviewing the recent audit report by the PSA on the performance of the NMC initial stages and this review is due to be considered by Council in July 2014.

Recent enhancements to the framework have included the establishment of the Decision Review Group to ensure that broad themes and learning points from panels are considered, and that links with training, processes and resource planning are revisited throughout the year. The group considers papers looking at issues such as adjournments levels, not well founded decisions and audits of the ICP decision making process. It is anticipated that Council will receive a paper on a 6 monthly basis based on the output of this group.

We have also undertaken additional audits of closed cases to ensure that we have assurance that existing processes and approval mechanisms are being complied with. We have also undertaken a comprehensive review of our ICP decision making process.

Mediation

We have extended the period for the mediation pilot to ensure that we are able to properly evaluate its use and value to HCPC's regulatory regime.

Guidance for Employers/Employer Engagement

We are working with the Policy and Standards Team to develop guidance on when to make a referral to the fitness to practise process. We are also looking at providing further guidance on the local resolution of cases. As part of our work in this area we will also be mapping the location of our cases.

Patients Association Audit

The Patients Association review of our fitness to practise took place in early May. The report is due in June. We will report to Council in due course on the findings of the Patients Association.

Whistleblowing

By virtue of the Public Interest Disclosure(Prescribed Persons) (Amendment) Order 2013 (SI 2013/2213) which implements a recommendation from the Francis Report that health and social professional regulatory bodies should be added to the list of prescribed persons to whom a whistleblower can make a qualifying disclosure to, HCPC became a prescribed person with effect from 1 October 2013. We are currently establishing the procedure and process to ensure that any public interest disclosures made to the HCPC is clearly identified and properly recorded and to ensure that HCPC evaluates and manages any such disclosure, including taking appropriate follow up action.

Cost Efficiencies

We are engaging Centre for Health Service Economics and Organisation to undertake research into the economic costs of fitness to practise investigations and how these costs vary across registrants with different characteristics.

Information Sharing and Memorandums of Understanding

We are in the process of finalising the MOU, Operating Protocol and Information Sharing Agreement with the Care Quality Commission. We continue to provide information to the CQC in response to the request for information as part of their inspection process. We are nearing completion of the MOU with the Disclosure and Barring Service and continue to provide information and data to the other Care Councils.

Financial Forecasting

We have engaged an external provider to review the FTP forecast model to ensure that it is FAST compliant. That review is due to complete by the end of May 2014.

Public Law Tender

We are currently in the process of preparing the tender documentation for the tender of public law and other portfolio services. It is hoped that this tender process will have completed by December 2014

Practice Note/Policy Review

We have set up a review cycle to review our practice notes and policy documents. This will help to ensure a systematic approach is taken to reviewing this documentation, with feedback sought from relevant stakeholders as appropriate. We will also update the practice notes and policy documents as required with any learning from reviews of decisions (including learning points received from the Professional Standards Authority) and relevant case law

Website Content Refresh and Maintenance

We have set up an internal team of FTP webmasters to review the information available in the FTP section of the HCPC website. The team has met with the Communications Department to arrange for the necessary changes to be made.

Transcription Tender

We are nearing the conclusion of the transcription tender. Interviews took place on 25 April 2014.

Registration Appeal Process Review

We have undertaken a review of the registration appeals process. This included a review of the use of case conferences and how bundles are prepared for hearing. The revises process was rolled out in early April 2014

Professional Body/Trade Union Partnership Forum

We have been working with Representative Bodies of the professions that we are responsible for regulation to set up a Partnership Forum. It is anticipated that the forum will meet every 6 months to discuss matters relating to HCPC's fitness to practise process. The purpose of the forum is to provide a means to communicate and share a common understanding of issues relating to the fitness to practise process, to provide an arena for dialogue on a range of issues including rules, policies, guidance, practice and procedure relating to the process, work in partnership to address specific concerns including those of registrants, complainants and the witnesses involved in the FtP process, seek to enhance the efficiency, integrity and robustness of the FtP process, provide an opportunity to provide updates on relevant policies or initiatives.

Recruitment

Employees

The budgeted headcount within the department is 88 including two people on maternity leave. There are currently 5 vacancies within the department according to the 2014/15 budget. We are currently recruiting for an Assurance and Development Officer following Kayleigh Birtwistle's move to the Business Process Improvement Department

and the new post of FTP Trainer. Following a recent round of recruitment we have filled the two vacancies within the Case Advancement Team (Richard Westlake and Katia Vandenbrouke – both existing case managers) and the 4 vacancies within the case management team (two of those posts arising out of Katia and Richard's move). We will also be shortly recruiting for a replacement scheduling officer following Amanda Viriri's move to the Case Management Team.

The training plan for the department for 2014/15 has been prepared and distributed. The plan includes a range of internal workshops, as well as media training, training with MIND on dealing with vulnerable complainants, situational leadership training and proofreading. The Case Managers are also undertaking a professional award in complaints handling and investigation and will undertake further advocacy training later in the year.

Partners

Members of the Adjudication team are currently involved in the shortlisting and interviewing of a number of new partner roles. The new roles are panel members for 10 professions, lay panel members and Panel Chairs

The team is also preparing the training material for the upcoming partner training for new panel members, refresher panel training, new chair training, refresher chair training and a review day for the legal assessors.
