Executive Summary	
<p>We set out our current KPIs when developing our current quality assurance model, which went live in September 2021. Although we have tweaked them in this time, we have not undertaken a full review to date. Since implementation, we have developed our understanding of what is normal and achievable through delivery of our activities, and note that current KPIs do not cover all four pillars of our education quality assurance (QA) model.</p> <p>In developing our KPIs and performance reporting, we aim to enable clearer understanding of team performance, ensuring we are focused on our core regulatory functions (approving and monitoring education providers and programmes), whilst linking to the four underpinning pillars of our education quality assurance model.</p>	
Action required	<p>The Committee is asked to consider and approve the proposal or recommendation.</p> <p>If accepted, the proposals will mean a changes to KPI reporting, to both the Executive Leadership Team (ELT) and the ETC.</p>
Previous consideration	Considered by the ELT in January 2026, and agreed to submit to the ETC for consideration in March 2026.
Next steps	Updated performance reports submitted to the ELT and the ETC following agreement by the ETC.
Financial and resource implications	There are no financial implications for these proposals, but there will be some internal resourcing impact to produce a new KPI report, and produce an annual report on the functioning of the model. 1. Background

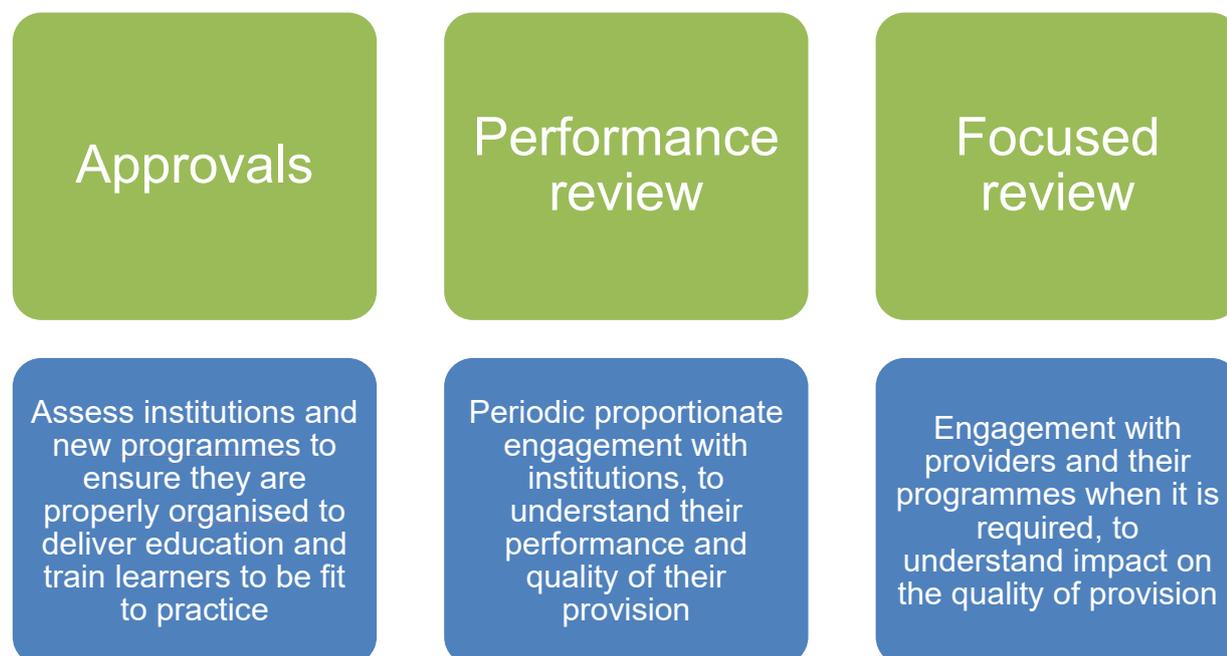
Team responsibilities

1.1 The Education team is responsible for:

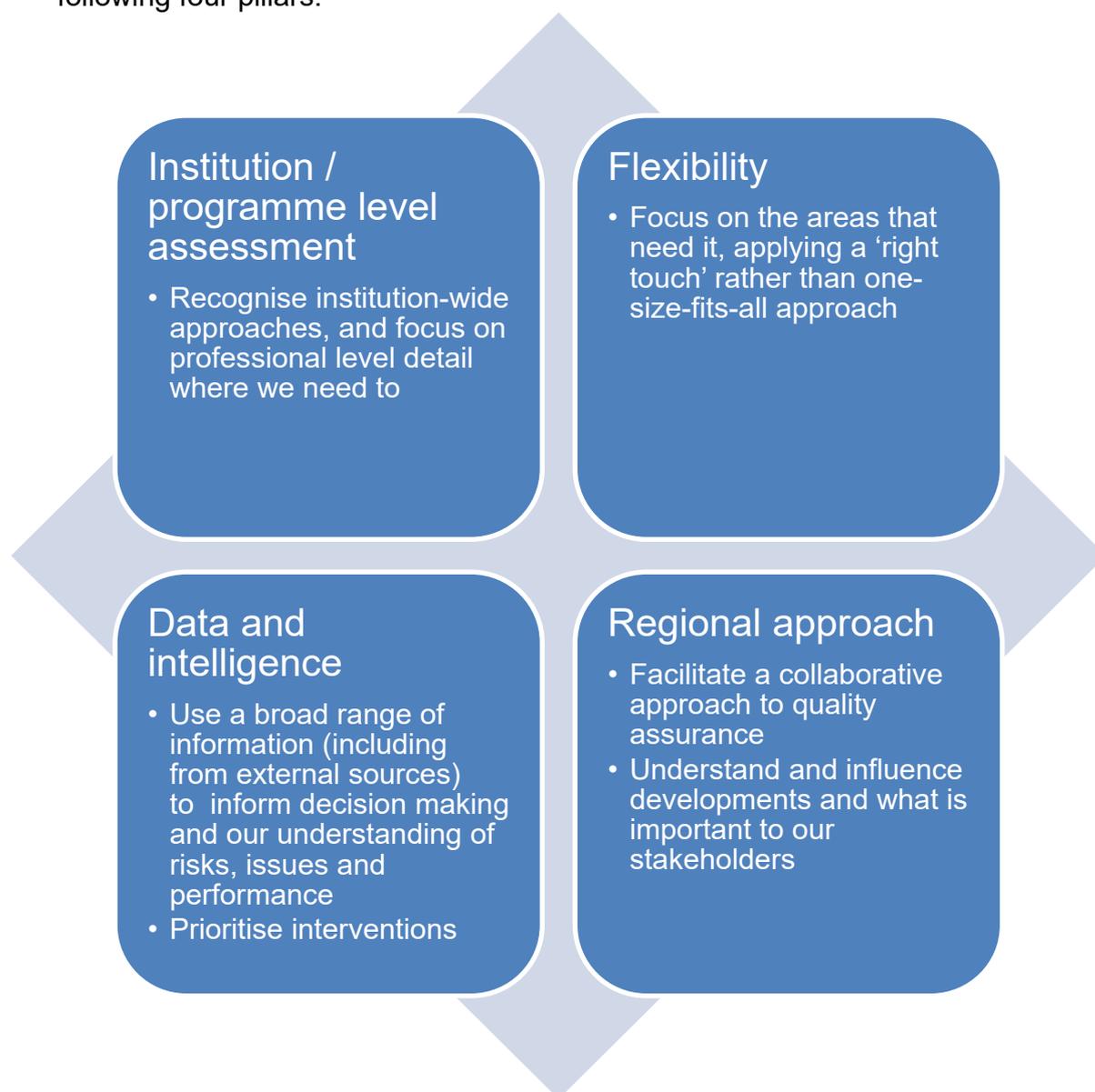
- 1.1.1 The approval and monitoring of education providers, and programmes that lead to registration via the UK application route, against the standards of education and training
- 1.1.2 Strategic and operational engagement with education stakeholders, including education providers, professional bodies, and sector bodies involved in the quality of education and training, to inform our view of education quality and to contribute to sector initiatives
- 1.1.3 Key contributions to proactive and responsive organisational activity, such as the review of the standards of education and training, the regulation of artificial intelligence, and the NHS 10 year plan

Our quality assurance model

1.2 The three main operational processes are:



1.3 The operation of our education quality assurance model is underpinned by the following four pillars:



Current KPI reporting

1.4 We set out our current KPIs when developing our current quality assurance model, which went live in September 2021. Although we have tweaked them in this time, we have not undertaken a full review since implementing the model.

1.5 We current report the following KPIs to ELT and ETC. Within the tables below, we have noted which of the four pillars each KPI links to.

- 1.7 Since implementation of our QA model, we have developed our understanding of what is normal and achievable through delivery of our activities. These expectations have been influenced by the following:
 - 1.7.1 Complexity of assessments has increased significantly, and across the board – and we expect continued and further complexity, and increased operational activity, due to external drivers
 - 1.7.2 Engagement undertaken has given us more insight which needs to be acted on in line with our regulatory role, enabling us to effectively manage risk
- 1.8 Current KPIs do not cover four pillars of our education QA model. Some KPIs only tangentially link to one of the pillars, and ‘data and intelligence’ and ‘regional approach’ are not covered at all.
- 1.9 Although measures are currently not aligned across ELT / ETC and Council KPIs, we are not proposing changing the Council KPIs at this stage. Once the new corporate strategy is agreed, we will refresh the Education KPIs reported to Council when all KPIs reported to Council are reviewed.

2. Proposal

Aim

2. Enable clearer understanding of team performance, ensuring we are focused on our core regulatory functions (approving and monitoring education providers and programmes), whilst linking to the four underpinning pillars of our education quality assurance model.

Proposed changes to team performance reporting – summary

- 2.1 In proposing changes to KPIs, we have:
 - 2.1.1 Reorganised KPIs against our operational processes (approvals, focused review, and performance review), and have included KPIs linked to engagement with the education sector as this has a significant impact on our core operational processes.
 - 2.1.2 Introduced new KPIs relating to performance against the four pillars that underpin our QA model, and linked existing KPIs to the pillars where possible.
 - 2.1.3 Adjusted targets based on increasing complexity, and our experience of running the current Education QA model for a four year period – this was done by reviewing more granular assessment stage service levels (ie the length of time expected through specific assessment actions. An example of this is how long we give our partners to review documentation and provide us with written feedback).

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- 2.1.4 Preferred a median average, as medians are best used when there are significant outliers in data¹. This aligns with reporting in FtP and Registration.
- 2.2 In the table below, we have listed all KPIs that we will use to monitor performance, but not all KPIs will be reported to ELT / ETC / Council. This proposal increases the number of KPIs reported to ELT and ETC from 7 to 11, which are broken down into the report with five KPIs reported across assessment processes (on one slide), and 1-2 KPIs added to the approval, performance review, focused review, stakeholder engagement, and stakeholder feedback slides. We have included real data for the proposed KPIs and report format in the appendix to this paper. Slides highlighted in purple replace equivalent slides in the current performance report.
- 2.3 The KPIs follow each of our core process (approvals, focussed reviews and performance reviews). We have included a column to show where these KPIs will be considered / reported. We are proposing that the reports to ELT and ETC are kept consistent with each other (as per the current reports).
- 2.4 We also propose providing an annual report on how the Education QA model is functioning. This differs from team performance linked to operational and stakeholder engagement activity, as it will consider how each of the model pillars are being delivered on a broader basis, and consider how improvements can be made.

We have decided to remove the ‘percentage of quality checks completed’ KPI, because it is not possible to progress assessments unless these quality checks are complete (ie we can only move an assessment forward within our system if relevant quality check field(s) are completed). Since reporting on this service level, it has always been met at 100%. Both of these points taken together mean that this KPI does not provide meaningful information about our performance.

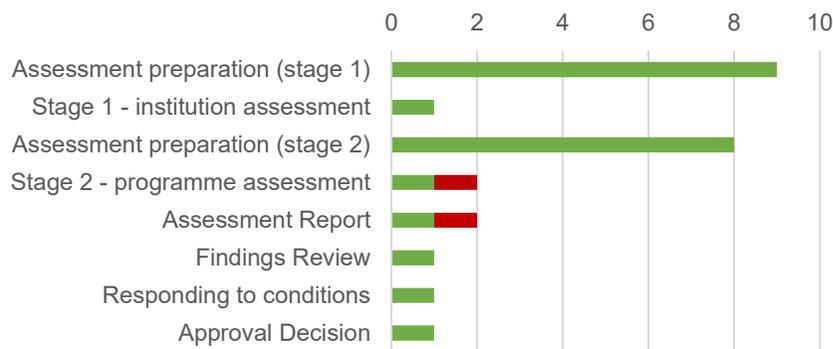

- There are currently 2 assessments which are outside of service levels – these are due to complexities arising for assessments of degree apprenticeship programmes having not secured an employer, which is a key requirement of our standards.
- Most assessments are in 'preparation' stages – where we are supporting education providers to provide their submissions. Submissions will be received over the next few months, which will change the work of the team from focusing on pre-submission support to active assessment.

Item 11 Professional pipeline

- We include this information to provide insight about learner number changes into the professions we regulate.
- Through our processes, we capture proposed learner numbers for each programme, at the point of approval and through our performance review assessments – figures presented through this table are not actual learner numbers, but are the maximum capacity we would expect programmes to be operating at.
- This data and information can be used by commissioning organisations and others to understand capacity within approved and proposed programmes.
- The work with our Insight and Analytics team to match pass lists registrant data is close to being concluded, which should give a fuller picture of how capacity translates to the number of individuals with approved qualifications, and the number who then become registered.

Programme capacity

- Most professions have increased capacity in the last 12 months, and are predicted to increase capacity further if proposed programmes become approved.
- Within current commissioning systems, there is a potential overall increase in capacity of 6%.
- Some professions have a larger increase in potential capacity change, notably occupational therapists (12%) and biomedical scientists (10%).

New programmes

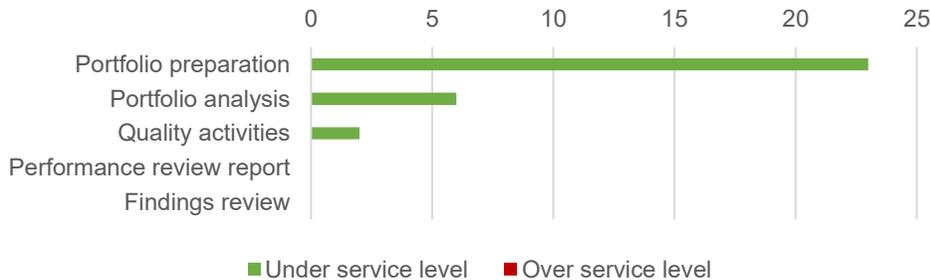
- New programmes are currently being developed in all professions except clinical scientists and prosthetists/orthotists
- There are no programmes currently proposed in Northern Ireland or Wales.

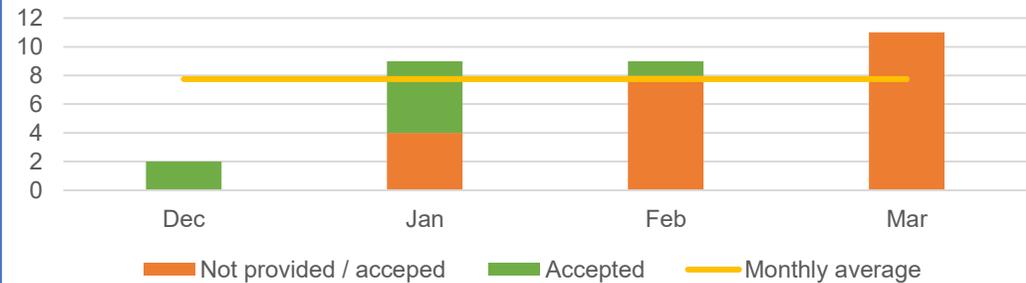

Current activity

- We have started receiving submissions from education providers for the 2025-26 academic year, with 8 out of 31 submissions received – this means we are now moving from helping education providers to prepare their submissions, to active assessment within the team.

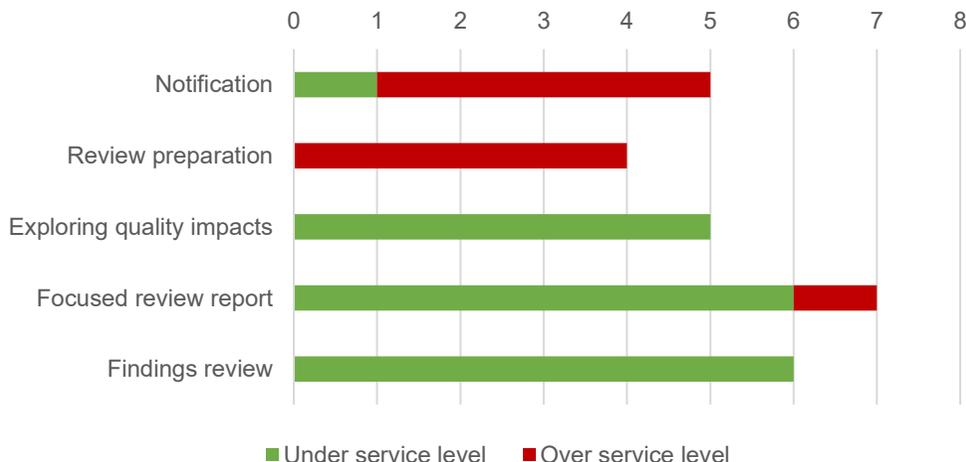
Review outcomes

- Variance in outcomes is driven mainly by non-HEIs not being included in data returns, and not establishing a data supply through the process.
- To remain confident with provider performance, we rely on regular supply of data and intelligence to help us understand provider performance outside of the periods where we directly engage with them.

Number of active cases - by case stage



- The two case stages for which we have most direct control within the team are the notification (initial triage) and report stages.
- Continued good progress has been made with concluding focused review assessments with the number of open assessments down by 10 to 28 since the last report (and down from a high of 43 in December).

Regarding workflow through the process, and service levels - compared to the last report:

- Significantly reduced assessments in the notification stage (from 23 to 5).
- Reduced the number in the review preparation stage from 5 to 4 – all of these are over service levels, but are complex assessments where education providers have needed more time to respond.
- Increased the number in the report stage – which shows that assessments are progressing.

The 'review preparation' and 'exploring quality impact' stages can take longer than our service levels, depending on education provider engagement and the complexity of the assessment.

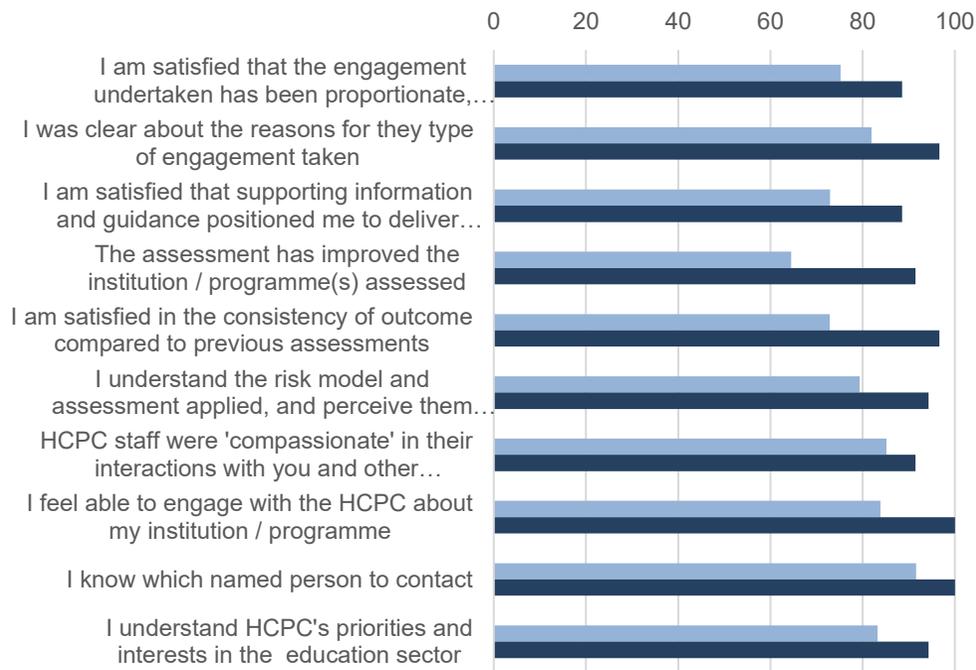

- We identified a small number of organisations to establish relationships with, and now have specific actions to identify key contacts at those organisations to enable cross-sector working

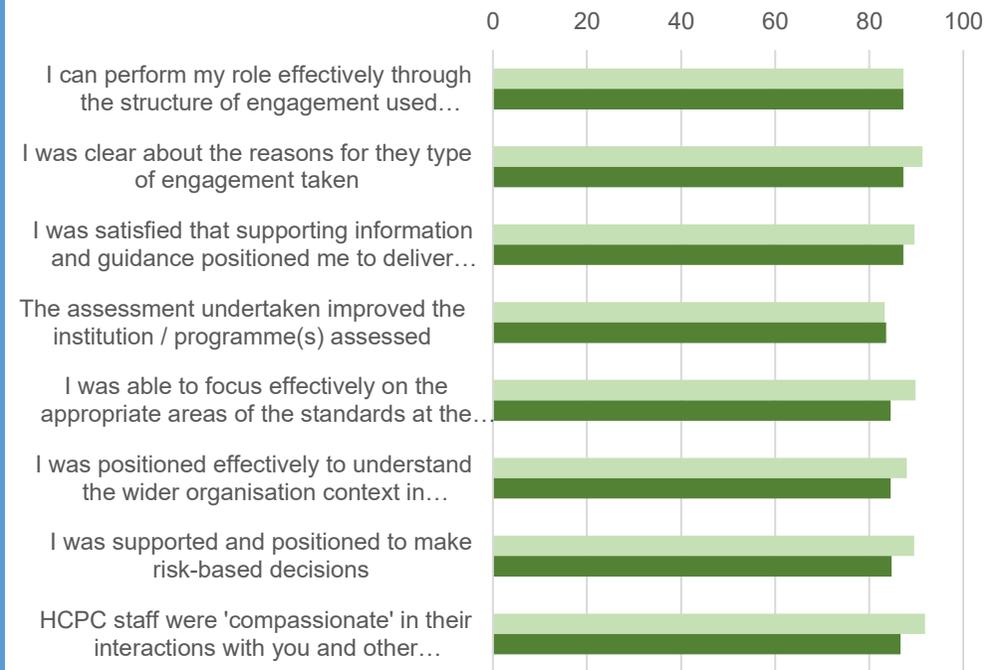
