## Executive Summary and Recommendations - Self-referral by Registrants

## Introduction

The Standards of Conduct, Performance and Ethics (SCPE) state that a registrant must provide any important information about conduct, competence or health. Registrant's must inform the HPC when they are:

- Convicted of a criminal offence (other than a motoring offence) or accept a police caution;
- Disciplined by any organisation responsible for regulating or licensing a health or social care profession; or
- Suspended or placed under a practise restriction by an employer or similar organisation because of concerns about their conduct or competence.

## **Decision**

The Investigating Committee is asked to approve the paper on Self-referrals and recommend that the Education and Training Committee do the same. The paper will then go to Council for note.

## **Background information**

The Registration Committee at it's meeting on the 13<sup>th</sup> September 2004 referred a paper on self-referrals to the Investigating Committee. Historically, self-referral cases had been processed as allegations. The procedure could not continue as it discouraged voluntary disclosure of convictions by registrants. A procedure is required which would allow the registrant to seek advice regarding the disclosure of a conviction. This advice would be issued with the warning that a self-referral could be referred to the Investigating Committee.
